

## Smoke free zones in Swale

Smoke free signs have been going up across Swale where local people don't want to breathe in second-hand smoke and vape fumes.

We asked you where smoke free signs should be installed and the most popular options included at primary school gates, children's play areas and outside of healthcare facilities.

As a result of your feedback, 25 signs have now been installed near hospitals such as the Sheppey Community Hospital, within green spaces and play areas like Faversham Rec, and at the entrances to leisure centres including Swallows Leisure Centre.

These signs are part of our campaign with Kent County Council to deliver smoke free public spaces across Swale, with the aim to reduce second-hand smoke exposure and educate smokers about the harm caused to both them and those around them.

### **Improvements**

for Heather House Community Hub

Heather House Community Hub will be able to offer more support to the local community after upgrades worth just under £30,000 are completed.

The hub in Sittingbourne provides a base for four vital local charities and secured funding to improve its facilities through our Community Infrastructure Grant, which was possible thanks to Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF).

SATEDA, Swale Community Care Project, Sittingbourne and Sheppey Helping Ukraine and Age UK Kent Rivers have each received grants to invest in essential improvements within the hub.

Domestic abuse charity SATEDA received £9,707 to establish a new branch.

This included furnishing the space, installing CCTV, a new door entry system, Wi-Fi, and storage.

SATEDA empowers women affected by domestic abuse through support, advocacy and education.

Swale Community Care

equipment for supporting

public access defibrillator,
air conditioning, and to
upgrade the function room
with electrical improvements
and presentation equipment.

Age UK Kent Rivers received £10,000 to install new baby changing facilities, robust main entrance doors, a modern door entry system, energy-efficient LED lighting, and improved signage.

Sittingbourne and Sheppey Helping Ukraine will use their £2,838 grant to help upgrade the consultation and event room, purchase a hybrid meeting camera, and lockers.

The charity supports Ukrainian nationals living in the UK.

The total improvements, amounting to £32,295, will benefit all charities operating within the hub, fostering collaboration and enhancing their ability to deliver vital services.



#### **All-aboard for SKLR!**

It will be easier than ever to enjoy a trip on the Sittingbourne and Kemsley Light Railway (SKLR).

Thanks to funding from Government's UKSPF, through our Community Infrastructure Grant, a wheelchairaccessible path and railings from the ticket office up to the platform at Sittingbourne Viaduct Station have been installed.

The path is just one part of improvements being made embarking and disembarking the trains and the project will also include general

enhancements to the surrounding area, making the trip to the railway more pleasant for families and those with disabilities.

The heritage railway, which is operated by volunteers, runs original steam trains along part of the old Bowaters Paper Railway line, which was built in 1905.

The line played a vital role in Sittingbourne's industrial past, transporting paper and raw materials between Sittingbourne and Ridham Dock.

#### Sheppey greenway getting back on track

A local community group has created an all-weather path along a portion of the Sheppey Light Railway line thanks to support from Government's UKSPF, through our Community Infrastructure Grant.

The Sheppey Light Railway Greenway is an ambitious project to open a walking, wheeling and cycling greenway following the path of the former railway line that ran from Leysdown to Queenborough.

The volunteer-led project is aiming to reopen as much of the old route as possible to create a safe way to cross the island on your own steam – on foot or by bike.

More than 20 volunteers and local businesses banded together to install the all-weather surface on the portion of council-owned track bed between Drove Road and the pedestrian link to Buddle Drive. The first stage of the project was completed in 2023 when volunteers cleared and widened the path from Scrapsgate to the Sheerness Golf Club.

They then cleared a thick forest of brambles which had made the next portion of the railway's path inaccessible and have now installed a fence along this section to improve the safety of the route. Our grounds maintenance contractor, Blenwood assisted the Sheppey Greenway clearances as part of the social value commitment in their contract with the council.

The group have now raised an additional £6,000 to fund a detailed route plan across the island which is now being drafted and will help outline the future layout and direction of the project.



#### Awards for Sheppey's beaches

Swale's three bathing beaches have been named amongst the best in the country with the announcement of this year's Blue Flag and Seaside Awards.

Sheerness beach will once again be flying the international Blue Flag Award this year which is widely considered to be the gold standard for beaches.

It is one of the beaches that meets the very highest standards for cleanliness, facilities and water quality and has also been awarded Keep Britain Tidy's Seaside Award.

Leysdown and Minster Leas beaches also received the Seaside Award, which recognises and celebrates the best beaches in the country.

This award measured their safety and services, the environmental information available, water quality and their litter and waste management.

RNLI lifeguards will also continue to keep people safe on Swale's bathing beaches after councillors agreed a new contract

The service, which has operated since 2012, sees qualified lifeguards patrolling Leysdown and Sheerness beaches on weekends and bank holidays from May, and seven days a week during summer (July to September).

They monitor sea conditions, set up the appropriate flags, monitor visitors to the beach, offer safety advice and are equipped with the best training and equipment.





#### Disposable BBQs and public spaces

With the warmer weather making its appearance now that summer has arrived, it can be tempting to head to the park or beach for a barbeque with friends and family. But not only do disposable barbeques pose a significant fire risk, it's also not permitted under our byelaws to use them in our public spaces.

Disposable barbecues retain heat for a considerable time after use, and the hot ashes can easily ignite surrounding areas, leading to bin fires or even larger blazes particularly in hot, dry conditions like those that we have been seeing recently. They also pose a significant risk of injury.

#### **Shellfish harvesting**


We want to remind everyone about the rules around harvesting shellfish along our coastline.

We've seen an increase in the amount of shellfish harvesting taking place on the Isle of Sheppey coast in recent years.



- collect only for your own personal consumption (up to 5kg)
- do not offer shellfish in exchange for money, products, or services
- leave smaller shellfish to grow and reproduce
- do not gather shellfish from SSSIs
- stay safe, be aware of the tides and weather

People are allowed to collect 5kg of oysters, cockles, mussels, and clams for their personal use, but doing so can come with risks.



Over harvesting can also have a detrimental impact on Swale's shellfish beds and can cause irreparable damage to these delicate ecosystems.





We've worked with charities and organisations to help more than 3,500 people with cost of living and wellbeing support and thanks to the Household Support Fund we have been able to extend this support for another year.

Following the success of last year's One Swale Roadshows we have organised a new roadshow every month for the remainder of 2025.

Support is available on a wide range of issues from financial hardship - providing things like vouchers, warm packs and bill discounts - employment and training opportunities to health and wellbeing.

This includes practical support such as food and fuel vouchers, water bill reductions and health check-ups, and offered advice on issues such as home safety, energy use, health and debt. These events have been made possible thanks to the hard work of the Swale CVS and Faversham Community Networking Group who helped the council organise the roadshows, and funding from the UK Government.

# Sign up to our community lottery and help support local good causes





The Swale Community Lottery gives people the chance to support their favourite local charities and non-profit organisations financially, while having the chance to win cash prizes each week. The lottery has also introduced a new monthly Super Draw.

The 40 charities, voluntary organisations and other not-for-profit groups of all shapes and sizes who have signed up to the lottery receive 50% of the proceeds from tickets they sell.

A further 10% from every ticket sale goes into a central fund which will be shared among other good causes through grants. The remainder goes towards prize funds and operating costs.

Thanks to the amazing support from residents, the charities that signed up to benefit from the lottery receive a monthly cash boost throughout the year.

And if this support continues, the lottery is set to raise a staggering £12,000 for local good causes in its first year.

The regular draws take place every week, and as well as the £25,000 jackpot, people could win prizes of £2,000, £250, £25 or more tickets.

Super draws take place on the last Saturday of each month, and you can buy extra tickets to "top-up" for super draw week – or if you don't want weekly tickets, you can buy tickets just for the super draw.

Tickets for the lottery are available to buy from **swalecommunitylottery.co.uk** and cost just £1.




#### **Beachfields**

Planning permission was received in January allowing for works to start on the site. Adventure Golf, which input from residents and local students, started works in April and the aim is that it will be completed in time for the summer holidays. Local students who took part in the design works have been invited to take the first putt. Internal works at the healthy living centre have begun following the groundbreaking event that took place in May.

#### Masters House

Works on the garages at Masters House have now officially begun. The garages will be managed by charity Launch It, which offers space for young entrepreneurs looking to start their own businesses with support and guidance from the hub manager.





# Sheppey College Extension

Things have been moving at pace over at the college. The steel frame of the EKC Sheppey College extension has been completed, and installation of the precast concrete planks is complete as well. The staircase is also in place, allowing you to walk through and experience the structure of the building from within it.

Works are now taking place on making the building water tight to allow for internal works to begin.

The aim is for the works to be completed in November 2025, with the new extension a wider range of opportunities for learners aged 16-19, alongside a brand-new junior college provision for students aged 14-16. From the start of the upcoming academic year, the new building will house specialist programmes including Level 2 Engineering, as well as Level 2 and Level 3 Creative Media.

#### And just like that, all three projects are in construction phase!

With Adventure Golf coming forward in July, Masters House welcoming the island's next creative business ventures and Sheppey College opening its expanded doors to new students in November, there is so much more to come. We will keep you posted.

# ARE YOU SURE YOU'RE RECYCLING RIGHT?



Did you know that not everything that can be recycled can be collected in your blue recycling bin at kerbside? This is because the recycling facility can only process certain items. We know it is sometimes confusing to know what can and can't be disposed of in your blue recycling bin. We have a handy online tool to help you understand what we can collect as a household recycling collection. This can be found at swale. gov.uk/what-goes-inmy-bin or by using the QR code below:



Household items that can currently be recycled in your blue bin are food & drink cans, mixed paper and cardboard, plastic bottles pots and trays, mixed glass, aluminum foils & trays, and empty aerosols.

Putting the wrong items in the recycling bins can contaminate whole lorry loads. This increases costs and causes delays. The main offending items are




Please do not put any of these contaminants in your recycling bins and bags. If a bin contains these items we will not be able to empty the bin until the items are removed.

# Community heroes awarded

Swale's community heroes were recognised and celebrated at this year's Civic Award ceremony.

Every year we ask the public to nominate residents who work tirelessly to better their communities, with the mayor and judging panel honouring them with awards.

Steven Pullen and Jordan Chan for their work on Swale Pride, Kelly Kay for bringing back Sittingbourne Carnival and Michelle Henneker for her work at Heather House and support for Ukrainian refugees were awarded the *Civic Award* which commends their efforts to make Swale a better place.

In addition to the Civic Awards, the *Mayor's Lifetime Achievement Award* which recognises a person's lifelong commitment to helping others was presented to Andrew Redman, for 40 years service as a coastguard rescue volunteer.

# Swale Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) Update

#### **June 2025**

Following Government's announcement about local government reorganisation, Kent and Medway councils have jointly responded to develop a local government reorganisation proposal for the area.

An initial business case was submitted in March 2025 which included a number of different geographic model options.
All of these options would still need further work and more evidence gathering. Based on this there has been initial feedback from Government, as a check-in point rather than a decision in terms of which model Kent adopts.

The comments from Government included the kev information needed to be included in the final submission. It also recognised that Kent, as a major entry point to the UK, brings its own unique challenges which will need to be considered, along with the impact of any model on key services such as adult and children social care; children with special education needs and disabilities; homelessness and pubic safety.

The final submission needs to be made to Government by 28 November, detailing the proposed unitary models, along with the evidence and justification for that proposal. We will be able to submit our preferred option, which may be different to other councils' views. Councillors will then be asked to agree this at a Full Council meeting in November.

There is a lot of work to do before November, and the councils across Kent and Medway are working to appoint a strategic partner to help prepare the final submission. We will heavily involved with this process and will be working with internal teams and our key external partners to ensure that our local context and risks and effectively captured.







# Cycle-re-Cycle donation point

It is now easier than ever to donate to the Swale Cycle-re-Cycle scheme and give the gift of affordable transport, while helping prisoners through their rehabilitation journey.

Our scheme sees HMP Swaleside inmates refurbish unwanted bicycles - upskilling themselves and taking positive steps towards rehabilitation whilst saving bikes from the tip.

The scheme also provides Swale residents with affordable, environmentally friendly transportation, that helps them keep active and healthy.

We've opened a new donation point for people to drop-off their unwanted bicycles, making donating to the scheme more accessible across the borough.

There is now a donation point at the Faversham Household Waste Recycling Centre, in addition to the one already open at the Sheerness Household Waste Recycling centre.



More than three hundred bikes have been refurbished and sold on through local community groups for just £10 each, making the scheme self-funding and sustainable.

We funded the initial supply of bike parts and workshop consumables, while Canterbury Bike Project trained an instructor to deliver the City & Guilds qualification at the prison.

If you have a roadworthy bike – two wheels and two brakes - you'd like to donate, drop it off at one of the donation points, along with new or good condition used parts.



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
