New lease of life for Eastchurch aviation memorial

We've invested £24,000 to restore the Eastchurch aviation memorial.

The memorial, which celebrates the Isle of Sheppey's role in the birth of aviation in the early 1900's, had been untended for a number of years, and had seen a lot of damage as a result of the neglect.

The damaged timber slats along the bench have been replaced and the brickwork along the back of the memorial has been repaired and the anti-climb paint removed.

A new drainage system has been installed to stop the build-up of rainwater, the pavement has been jet washed and the stone monument has been specially cleaned.















Restoration for Sheerness war memorial

The 100-year-old war memorial in Sheerness has been restored.

We worked with Sheerness and Queenborough town councils, Minster,


Eastchurch, Warden and Leysdown parish councils, Sheerness United Masonic Centre, Peel Ports and local traders to fund the improvements.

We contributed £90,000 to this project from the Sheppey Improvement fund and Sheppey Area Committee.

The step has been replaced with a slope to improve accessibility and a new Portland stone wall has been built specially to include the names of 988 soldiers, seamen and airmen who were missed off when the memorial was first built. It now also includes the names of those local people from

the island who were lost when HMS Princess Irene exploded off the shore of Sheerness in 1915.

The repairs were completed in time for celebrations of the 100-year anniversary of the memorial. This was marked with a parade and dedication ceremony on Sunday 24 April, organised by Sheerness Town Council.



#2-minute beach clean in Minster Leas

Take just two minutes on your next visit to our local beaches to help keep them litter free and prevent pollution of our coastline.

We've installed three beach cleaning boards - complete with litter pickers and rubbish bags - as part of the #2minutebeachclean campaign at Minster Leas, Leysdown and Shellness beaches.

The boards can be found at Leysdown Seafront, Neptune Beach Café on Shellness Road, and at the Whitehouse access gate on Minster Leas beach.

Beachgoers can help keep our beaches clean by simply taking two minutes to pick up some litter they see, sharing a picture of it on social media using the hashtag #2minutebeachclean, and then disposing of the litter in the appropriate bins.











Affordable homes for Swale

Councillors visited one of Sittingbourne's housing development's in May to see the progress of 140 affordable homes.

The development at the old cement factory off Cooks Lane was purchased by

Sanctuary in 2016 and work to build the 155 houses and 87 apartments is due to be complete next year.

Of the 242 homes being built, 140 of them will be affordable housing, with 73 shared ownership and 67 homes for people on the housing register made up of one and two bedroom apartments and two, three and four bedroom houses.



Sheerness Clocktower

After its extensive restoration work by Smith of Derby Clockmakers, the clocktower is back in its rightful place in Sheerness.

It made the journey from the workshop in Derby in May where it was then reinstalled back on the Broadway.

Back in October the clockmakers undertook the huge task of breaking down the clocktower into each of its component parts so that they could commence the extensive repairs.

The restoration included fabrication of new lanterns to match the design of the original gas lanterns that would have been hanging from the clocktower in 1902. As well as the complete restoration, the clocktower has been returned to its original colours.

A time capsule was placed under the base of the clocktower before it was lifted into position piece by piece.



Swale's beaches recognised as some of the best with blue flags

Leysdown, Minster Leas and Sheerness beaches have all received blue flags again this year.

After meeting the highest standards for cleanliness, facilities and water quality, all three beaches have been awarded with a blue flag.

Leysdown beach has also received the Seaside Award from Keep Britain Tidy, which is presented to England's best beaches.

There's a lot of strict criteria to meet to be awarded a Blue Flag, making it a fantastic achievement for all of those involved in helping to keep Swale's beaches at their best.

The blue flags show visitors that our beaches are clean and safe, and that they meet the highest environmental and bathing water quality standards.

Our beaches have lifeguards throughout the summer and the high quality bathing water our visitors expect.







The Royal National Lifeboat Institution lifeguards will be on duty seven days a week from Saturday 9 July until Sunday 4 September. It's encouraged that if you want to swim then to stay between the locations marked as being covered by the lifeguards at Minster, Leysdown and Sheerness beaches.

If you see someone getting into trouble in the water dial **999** and ask for the coastguard.

Help shape the future of Boughton and Dunkirk

We're encouraging you to have your say on Boughton and Dunkirk's neighbourhood plan while it's available for public consultation.

Neighbourhood plans give local communities the opportunity to shape how future development is managed in their local area, giving people the opportunity to be involved in decisions that affect them.

The Boughton and Dunkirk neighbourhood plan, organised by parish councils in consultation with the local community, sets out to manage the challenges of future development until 2031 while maintaining a safe and affordable community where everyone has access to education, health and leisure facilities.



Councillor Mike Baldock, chair of the policy and resources committee at the council, said:

"The Boughton and Dunkirk neighbourhood plan outlines how the local community wants to manage future development while preserving the natural heritage of the area.

"The community is keen to maintain a safe and affordable place to live where families can raise children with access to schools, doctors and leisure facilities, and where elderly people who have lived their whole lives in the village can stay and be cared for."

Councillor Monique Bonney, chair of the regeneration and property committee at the council, said:

"The Boughton and Dunkirk neighbourhood plan public consultation is now open.

"I encourage anybody with an interest to have a look at the plan and give their feedback, it's important that provision is made for the future of the communities while preserving and protecting what we already have."





The consultation runs to Monday, 25 July.

Play areas get much needed upgrades

We've started on the latest round of works to play areas in the borough.

To ensure that children around Swale can continue to enjoy the parks and play areas available to them, we have been making necessary repairs and upgrades to equipment as well as including more inclusive equipment for those with disabilities.

In May we started work at Manor Grove play area in Sittingbourne and Millfield open space in Faversham.

We're installing a new play area and fitness zone at Manor Grove and replacing the equipment at Millfield.

Both areas were closed while the new play areas and fitness equipment were being installed.

This is just the start of the improvements being made across play areas in Swale over the next few months.

Johnson Road, Festival Fields, Vincent Gardens, Kemsley Rec, Diligent Drive and Grove Park play areas have all also had investment.





Car club Faversham

We worked with hiyacar to run a three year car club trial in Faversham.

The three hybrid cars can be found at Central car park, Institute Road car park and Queens Hall car park and can be used from one hour to 10 days.

Each car club vehicle can take up to 18 cars off the road, encouraging less car ownership and more active travel - reducing congestion and carbon emissions.

You can start using the cars following these simple steps:

- download the hiyacar app
- create an account all within the app and select hire a car
- follow all the steps to get verified (you'll need your driver's licence and to provide a verified address)
- it can take as little as 90 seconds to register and get verified

Rainbow Homes to deliver affordable homes

Rainbow Homes is preparing its first project to deliver new affordable homes in Swale.

The new council-owned housing company is planning to deliver more than 170 new properties at three sites in Sittingbourne, and has appointed Counties & Capital Consulting Ltd (C&CC) to oversee the project.

The new homes are planned for Cockleshell Walk, East Street and Fountain Street and will be the first built by Rainbow Homes.

C&CC will manage and advise on all stages of works, from concept designs, to securing planning permissions, sourcing all project professionals and overseeing the build process through to the successful letting of the new high-quality homes.

Emma Wiggins, director at Rainbow Homes said:

"Rainbow Homes is a wholly council-owned venture that has been set up to deliver new, affordable homes in Swale.

"We will be working with our partners to provide local people with a home of their own, built to a good standard and offering a mix of affordable tenures. "Our focus will be on creating sustainable communities which make a real difference to the lives of those who live there.

"Our plans for these three sites are still being finalised, and we're getting ready to submit planning applications in the next few months.

"This is the first project we're hoping to deliver, and we're already considering plans for other locations around the borough to give as many local people as possible the chance of moving into an affordable home of their own."

The managing director of C&CC, Neill Tickle, has previously worked with Swale Council and within the borough for more than 15 years as the development director for local housing association, Optivo. During this time he was responsible for successfully delivering many property developments including the Regis Gate Extra Care scheme and the Wild Ash Croft regeneration project.

Neill said:

"We're over the moon to have been selected from the many companies who entered into the procurement process.

"We're most excited to assist Rainbow

Homes in delivering these transformational regeneration projects that will continue to improve Sittingbourne town centre and benefit local people and the community.

"It's refreshing to see that despite the wide range of political parties and views represented withing Swale, the one factor that everyone agrees with is that they must do their part to help with the housing crisis in delivering more affordable housing for the local community and the people who need it the most – we are delighted to be able to help them achieve this, every step of the way!"

Lifesaving defibrillators installed around Swale

Village halls, churches, activity centres and car parks are just some of the locations around Swale that now have public access defibrillators.

The lifesaving equipment has been installed at 27 locations around the borough after we committed almost £20,000 of funding last year.

The defibrillators are fully accessible to the public 24/7 and have a nominated person appointed to maintain them.

Historic building to be repaired following storm damage

Work to repair storm damage to the historic TS Hazard building in Faversham has now been completed.

The Grade II* listed building was due to undergo some minor repairs when Storm Eunice caused further damage to the roof. This led to the works being rescheduled to allow additional repairs to be carried out.

The initial repairs were planned as part of our increased maintenance of the building, to help preserve it while the plans are drawn up for its future use.

As this is an important Grade II* listed building, we've commissioned work to help us better understand what we need to do to further secure the building.


We're actively looking for new uses for the building that are compatible with its historic form and importance, and we have had some interest from potential tenants.

The building dates from the fifteenth century and takes its name from the Training Ship Hazard, which was supplied to the navy by the town to fight the Spanish Armada in 1588.

Swale could see double electric vehicle charge bays with new funding

Drivers of electric vehicles could soon have more than double the chance to charge their vehicles with 18 new charging bays across Swale.

We've received £106,000 from the Government's Office for Zero Emission Vehicles (OZEV),and will also contribute £42,000 from our improvement and resilience fund, to buy and install nine electric twin charge points, creating 18 charging bays.



Councillor Julian Saunders, environment committee chair at the council, said:

"We're delighted with the funding to install 18 new electric vehicle charging points across the borough.

"The £106,000 from OZEV and the £42,000 we'll be contributing from our improvement and resilience fund will help us double the number of bays we have here in Swale."

Councillor Tim Valentine, environment committee vice chair at the council, said:

"We're currently looking at options in Sheerness, Sittingbourne and Faversham where onstreet charging demand is at its highest.

"This is usually where people don't have a driveway and can't charge their electric vehicles on the street.

"By installing our own charge points we can also keep charging prices lower for these residents.

"As a condition of the funding, we'll be installing 7kw chargers which are suitable for a slow overnight charge rather than quick destination charging."



Jubilee weekend celebrated in Swale

Events, street parties, picnics and fun days were had over the long bank holiday weekend, with many people welcoming friends and family into their homes and back gardens across Swale to help celebrate the Queen's platinum Jubilee.

It was a unique and historic moment to witness the Queen mark 70 years on the throne.



Don't make it easy for fly-tippers

Help cut down on fly tipping by knowing your duty of care

Ways to responsibly dispose of your waste

We want to remind everyone to be wary of who is offering to take your waste away and to always check they have a licence to carry waste. To check whether someone is licenced to carry waste visit the Environment Agency website: bit. ly/1YIHCOD or call 03708 506506. And always make sure you get and keep your waste carrier's contact details - ideally from a receipt or invoice.

When ordering a new fridge, freezer, washing machine or home appliance, many retailers will take away your old one for a small price.

If you have large items to get rid of, but can't get to the tip, our bulky waste collection service can help – and there's no danger of it ending up in a local field. You can book a bulky collection through our website: swale.gov.uk/bulky-item-collection or by calling: 01795 417888.



Don't forget your duty of care


Many people might not realise that, by using an unlicensed waste carrier, they could be contributing to fly-tipping in our countryside. If fly-tipped rubbish is traced back to you, and you can't prove who took it off your hands, you'll have failed in your legal duty of care and could be held responsible.

You could get an unlimited fine, a criminal record and be charged for the cost of clearing up your fly-tipped waste.

Think carefully before paying for your rubbish to be taken away: if someone tells you on social media that they can do the job at a very low rate, cash in hand, ask yourself how they can afford to do it so cheaply. If something looks too good to be true, it often is.

Saying "I didn't think to check them out" won't help if your waste carrier ends up dumping your rubbish illegally.

↑Levelling Up Sheerness

The bid for up to £20 million of Government funding for Sheerness was submitted this month.

We worked on plans to bid for the maximum amount of funding available from the Levelling Up Fund and updated local residents at the Sheppey Area Committee as to the progress in June.

The update follows weeks of work to look at the ideas and suggestions from a consultation earlier in the year. These have been costed and assessed to see what would meet the Government's criteria for the funding, the final bid was submitted on 6 July.

Councillor Monique Bonney, chair of the regeneration and property committee at the council, said:

"We were amazed, but not surprised, by the enthusiastic response to the consultation earlier this year. There were some great ideas, but just as importantly there was a fantastic amount of support from the local community.

"We've spent the last couple of months working on options and costings for ideas and plans, but we had to be realistic.

"Big ambitions and increasing prices meant we needed to think carefully about what we put in the bid if we wanted it to be approved and deliver the improvements Sheerness deserves.

"By doing this work now we put together a solid blueprint for breathing new life into the town, and we'll be in a stronger position than ever before to bid for other funding in the future.

"The plans are the first stage in what we hope will be the revival of Sheerness, with benefits that spread across the whole Island.

"We want to deliver better facilities for residents with expansion of the health centre. There will be more opportunities for local young people with a greater range of courses available from the college, and Master's House will help create and support local jobs.

"We want to build on the town's holiday heritage and create a place for locals and visitors to enjoy, with better connections between the high street, station and seafront.

"Bringing in attractions like tag active, soft play and adventure golf, alongside a new café, outdoor gym and new toilets will help bring people back to the town.

"A new pool wasn't part of this phase of the bid, and a number of other suggestions simply aren't feasible on the site or weren't possible in the timescales the government set.

"We have to thank everyone who's helped us get to where we are now. We put together an ambitious bid that stays within the government's funding limit and can start delivering genuine improvement for Sheerness."
