## Help save lives in your community with defibrillator grants

Local community groups can now apply for funding to help towards buying and installing a public access defibrillator.

We've made £20,250 available to encourage the installation of a public access defibrillators at village halls and community centres around Swale.

Local community groups can apply for up to £750 towards the cost of purchasing and installing the equipment that can help save someone's life.

Public access defibrillators must be located in places fully accessible to the public 24/7. Applicants would also need to appoint a nominated person to maintain them.

All defibrillators must be purchased and installed by the end of March 2022.



**Cllr Mike Baldock,** cabinet member for planning at the council, said:

"We're making £20,250 available to support lifesaving equipment at village halls and community centres around Swale.

"Community groups and local organisations can apply for up to £750 to go towards the cost of purchasing and installing a public access defibrillator and housing cabinet.

"Defibrillators can provide lifesaving support to people in cardiac arrest. For every minute someone is in cardiac arrest without CPR and access to a defibrillator, their chances of survival drop by up to 10 per cent.

"With ambulance response times increasing, having a publicly accessible defibrillator nearby can mean the difference between life and death for someone in cardiac arrest.

"The grant scheme is now open, and I encourage any local group with a community building to see if you're eligible."

## Sheerness Clock Tower restoration underway

Work is well underway on the full restoration of the 119-yearold Sheerness Coronation Memorial Clock. The restoration, funded by Swale council, will bring the clock and tower back to its former glory, in its original colours of green and gold and with the fabrication of new lanterns to match those originally installed in 1902.

The clock tower was dismantled over three days in September with scaffolding being erected and the clockmakers beginning the delicate task of loosening those 119-year-old bolts.



The clocktower finial and bell were carefully lowered to the ground, housing the Sheerness clocktower bell, weighing around 100kg and cast by John Taylor & Co. of Loughborough. The clock mechanism was then removed, and the clock faces loosened from the tower and lowered to the ground. With the Broadway closed, the work began to crane on the four pieces of the clock and tower onto the vehicles responsible for transporting the clock tower north to the workshop of clockmakers Smith of Derby.

Timber hoarding has been installed around the clocktower site with historic images of the clocktower, alongside information on its history and the restoration project.

The graphics include a timeline highlighting the key dates for the clocktower, alongside a QR code linking you to blogs on the Visit Swale website for the most up to date information on its restoration.

Work on the restoration of the Sheerness Clocktower is underway in Derby.

The clocktower has been broken down into its original component parts, as it would have arrived in Sheerness nearly 120 years ago.

The parts can be seen here in the images, having been palletised by the team ready to be bead blasted, prior to its zinc coating.

## Planning on planting a tree?

Choose your site carefully Give your tree plenty of room to grow. Plant away from buildings and overhead power lines.

Choose your tree carefully Look at the tree. Will it grow well in your planting site? Will it like the soil? Does it like sunny or shady places? Do you want a fruit tree?

Take care before and after planting Keep your tree's roots out of the wind. Make sure roots are kept wet during planting. **Digging** Dig the plant pit to the correct depth so roots are planted just below the surface. It should be wide enough to allow the roots to spread.

**Staking** A stake is needed for three years at the most if the tree is taller than 1.5m when you plant it.

**Guards** If there are rabbits, hares or deer in your area, use a tree guard.

**Tending** Between March and September, check your trees. Cut off any dead branches.

**Loosening** Is the tie too tight? If it is, loosen it or remove it if the tree doesn't lean.

**Clearing** Water your trees during dry weather. Remove all the grass and weeds for a radius of 0.5m. Put down a mulch mat or old piece of carpet.

## Get help to get online

Families on low incomes will be helped to make the most of digital opportunities as part of a project to improve digital inclusion across the Isle of Sheppey.

We've working with Kent County Council on a scheme that will provide low-income families with access to digital resources and skills.

The project will provide donated digital devices to low-income families as well as digital skills support for people looking to start or improve their digital knowledge. There will also be investment into the digital infrastructure of the island initiatives such as a community wi-fi trial rollout and the bolstering of existing digital access points such as the Mobile Matters work conducted by Sheppey Matters.

Kent County Council has provided £54,904 towards this project, from the Helping Hands scheme launched earlier this year by Kent County Council Leader, Roger Gough. £35,000 of this will be made available to voluntary and community sector organisations to equip them better digitally.

The key areas of focus will be employability skills, digitaloriented financial support, social isolation and mental health, and accessibility to services.

The groups being targeted for support will be digital seniors, e-withdrawn residents, passive and uncommitted users, and settled offline communities. Cllr Angela Harrison,

cabinet member for health & wellbeing, said:

"The pandemic has sped up the rate of services being provided online, which can bring benefits to lots of people, but if you're not online, or don't feel comfortable using the technology, you can feel left behind.

"There can also be a certain amount of stigma for people who don't have devices that businesses or services assume everyone has access to.

"We want to work with people to help make sure they can access the technology they might need to, and they are comfortable using it safely."

**Cllr Roger Gough,** Leader of Kent County Council said:

"I am pleased we are working with Swale Borough Council and partners, including the Pyramid Project CIC, to improve digital inclusion and skills on the Isle of Sheppey.

"This is one of many projects across the county we are supporting, delivering on our commitment to provide assistance to those who need it and helping our residents build back from the past 18 months of COVID" Local organisation Pyramid Project CIC have been awarded £19,904 to deliver skills workshops and training courses.

Paul West, Director of Pyramid Project CIC, said:

"The digital skills and understanding that Sheppey residents are required to have to improve their employability prospects and to keep connected with friends and family is at an all-time high.

"The coronavirus pandemic has highlighted a lot of the basic digital needs Sheppey residents have and through the support of KCC and Swale Borough Council we are now able to address a number of those needs through meaningful practical skills courses and workshops centred around digital technologies.

"The courses will be available until the end of March 2022 for Sheppey residents, and we encourage anyone who needs support in improving their digital skills to get in touch."

## Fuel and Water Home Adviser Service

With the colder winter months ahead, paying fuel and energy bills can be daunting.

If you need extra support in reducing your water and energy bills, you can reach out to our Fuel and Water Home Adviser Service for help and advice.

The free and confidential service can help with advice on how to effectively manage energy and water use in your homes, and support if you are eligible to apply for grants and emergency fuel vouchers. Our adviser can also help pensioners apply for a lower tariff on their water bills.

You can make a self-referral to the service, and housing officers, health workers, family finance workers, housing associations, food banks and other charities are able to make a referral on your behalf.

#### Help keeping your home warm

You may be able to get help towards keeping your home warm, including if you're receiving certain types of benefits or you have a health condition which is affected by living in cold conditions.

We may be able to refer you for extra support if you haven't previously qualified for help under benefit-based schemes and you're:

- in fuel poverty
- on a low income
- vulnerable because of a health condition which is affected by cold living conditions

## Top tips for saving energy and water

There's some simple ways to save money and energy in your home:

#### **Changing lightbulbs**

New lightbulbs use less energy and cost less to run. By replacing them with LED with a lower wattage but the same light output you could save £10 per year per lightbulb.

## Boiling water with a kettle

By only filling a kettle with the amount of water you need for your hot drink you can avoid wasting energy boiling excess water. You can save more than £23 a year just by being careful with how you use kitchen appliances.

Christmas generates more waste around your house than usual and it can be difficult to know what to do with it. Where possible it's a good idea to reduce the amount being produced, but a lot can also be reused and recycled before putting it in with general waste.

#### Reuse

Unfortunately artificial trees can't currently be recycled. Offer an unwanted tree to friends or family, or book a slot and take them to your local Household Waste and Recycling Centre.

Christmas gift bags, chocolate tins, tinsel and Christmas decorations, crisp or whiskey tubes can all be reused. Even Christmas cards can be used for handmade gift tags next year.



#### Scrunch it and see!

Did you know that not all wrapping paper can be recycled?

But there is a quick and easy way to test if it can be recycled or not. Simply grab a handful and scrunch it into a ball, if it stays in a ball when you open your hand then it can go in with your recycling. If it doesn't, pop it in your general waste or save it for wrapping next year's presents!



#### Recycle

Be sure to pop empty cardboard boxes, Christmas cards and wrapping paper (make sure to do the scrunch test) in with your recycling.

Chocolate tins, cardboard chocolate boxes, plastic inner trays, chocolate advent calendars, foil trays, empty cranberry sauce and brandy butter jars and lids, and empty cream pots can also all be recycled.

Your real Christmas tree can be chopped up and put in your garden waste bin. Alternatively, book in a slot at your local household waste and recycling centre. Head to the Kent County Council website for the Christmas opening times at tips.

#### General waste

Don't forget to pop any bubble wrap, polystyrene, plastic wrapping, sweet and chocolate wrappers, used party poppers, glittery Christmas cards and wrapping paper that doesn't stay scrunched in with your general waste.

## Bin collections this Christmas

Due to when Christmas Day and New Year's day fall this year, there will be no changes to general waste and recycling collections over the Christmas period.

Our contractors will be working the Bank Holidays, so collections will remain the same Monday to Friday.

Garden waste and bulky waste collections will be suspended from Monday 27 December for two weeks and will restart on Monday 10 January.

Clinical collections will remain the same.

As ever, our contractors will do their best to collect your general waste or recycling on the day that it is scheduled, however please do check swale. gov.uk for any updates on disruptions if there is any adverse weather this winter.





## Still time to take part in the Local Plan consultation

There's still time to let us know your views on our Local Plan.

We are seeking further views on the options for a development strategy for the Local Plan Review.

The Regulation 18 consultation runs until 5pm on Monday 29 November, providing the public with the opportunity to respond to a number of questions about a broad development strategy that could bring forward the borough's future development needs.

The Council has identified five potential options for consideration and seeks views on how the Local Plan could address the key challenges facing the borough including responding to climate change and the effects of the covid pandemic.

## COP26

The UK played host to the 26th UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP26) in Glasgow on 31 October – 12 November 2021 to help set an international pledge to prevent global warming.

The COP26 summit brought parties together to accelerate action towards the goals of UN Framework Convention on Climate Change.

Prior to COP26 we joined the UK100 along with 88 other local councils, representing and 34,030,804 million people, committing to meeting Net Zero at least five years earlier than the UK government.

UK100's Net Zero Pledge commits local authorities to cutting their council emissions to Net Zero by 2030 and those of their residents and businesses by 2045 - five years ahead of the UK government's 2050 target.

Clir Tim Valentine, cabinet member for the climate emergency at the council, said: "When we took office in 2019, one of our first actions was to declare emergency and set emergency and set ambitious targets for the council and the borough.

"This has been backed up by an action plan adopted in April 2020.

Swale Borough Council now runs a fleet of electric vans, has new homes to emit less carbon than permitted under the current building under the current building to make our own estate

"We are delighted that our ambition is being recognised by membership of UK100. Local councils are leading on climate action and we look forward to learning about new solutions from other ambitious councils.

"COP26 gives us a fantastic opportunity to lobby Government to provide the finance and powers councils need to do so much more to meet our ambitious targets for the borough."

Across Swale we produce **1,150 kilotons** of CO2 per year – this works out at 7.7 tonnes per person. To start to understand what you can do help reduce this, you first need to calculate your carbon footprint, which you can do by visiting: **footprint.wwf.org.uk** 

Trees, hedges and woodland are the ultimate form of carbon capture. A young wood can lock up **400+ tonnes** winter as part of our offsetting plans and to encourage biodiversity. You can help too by planting trees at home or keeping an eye out for local tree planting projects and events.

Freeze it – If you make some extra space in your freezer on the lead up to Christmas you can stock it with the milk, bread, cakes, and mince pies you may have bought too much of. Recycle it – Anything that you can't use up can go in your black and orange food waste bin. If you need help with what can and can't go in your food waste bin, visit:

Garden waste collections will be suspended from Monday 27 December for two weeks and will restart on Monday 10 January.

## Faversham's walled garden lease extended for 25 years

The historic walled garden at The Mount in Faversham can now be restored to its former glory thanks to a 25-year lease from Swale Borough Council.

Brogdale CIC hold the current lease which will be extended by 25-years when it expires in June 2022. Since taking on the garden in 2017, Brogdale CIC have installed a self-composting toilet, solar lighting and made a classroom from an old unusable boiler room.

The garden also hosts specialist education for students aged 16-25 years, and carpentry workshops and youth clubs for young people in social care.

Rebecca O'Neill, Managing Director at Brogdale CIC, said:

"We've leased the beautiful walled garden for five years and have put in an incredible amount of work. With a longer lease, we can now fully invest in the Georgian garden and restore it to how it was more than 200 years ago.

"We've already restored an old boiler room to create a classroom for horticulture sessions with our disadvantaged young people from Craftworks College, and installed a self-composting toilet, solar lighting, and well for watering the garden.

"Now we have the certainty of a longer lease, we can apply for external funding to renovate a beautiful old glass house that has collapsed, and restore the paths and gardens for the community to enjoy."

**Clir Roger Truelove**, leader of the council, said:

"Brogdale CIC have done tremendous work in the time they've leased the gardens, improving the grounds, and offering opportunities to disadvantaged young people.

"Now we have approved the extension of the lease, a future visit to the walled garden could offer a step back in time with a sustainable future."

**Cllr Richard Palmer**, cabinet member for community at the council, said:

"The walled garden dates back to Georgian times, and to have it fully restored would be a real asset for the community.

"The site was previously used as a rehabilitation facility for officers returning from the first and second world wars, and having the garden brought back to life is wonderful to see."

Councillors agreed the extension of the lease at the last cabinet meeting on Wednesday, 22 September.







## First year of Swale's Area Committees

Last year we introduced area committees to help you have your say on council decision making for your local community.

Area committees give local councillors a chance to connect with the public and bring valuable local insight to council decision-making. Honest and open dialogue with the public is a key priority for the council, so the introduction of the area committees was an important way for us to have that open dialogue.

Now, one year on from the first committee meetings, here is how each committee has been working with local communities on issues that matter most to you.

The four committees are made up of all the councillors representing wards in the following areas:

- Eastern Abbey, Boughton and Courtenay, East Downs, Priory, St Ann's, Teynham and Lynsted and Watling wards.
- Sheppey Minster Cliffs, Queenborough and Halfway, Sheerness, Sheppey Central and Sheppey East
- Sittingbourne -Chalkwell, Homewood, Kemsley, Milton Regis, Murston and Roman

 Western - Bobbing, Iwade and Lower Halstow, Borden and Grove Park, Hartlip Newington and Upchurch, the Meads, Woodstock and West Down.

All committees provided important feedback into the future provision of waste collection and street cleansing.

Western, Sittingbourne and Sheppey committees have all held sessions to raise awareness of issues relating to secondary school provision and provide the opportunity for the public to ask the Kent County Council area education officer questions about education and provisions in their area.

Eastern area committee has given the public the opportunity to voice their concerns about flooding to Kent County Council and their local MP. These conversations have resulted in the MP setting up a meeting with all relevant agencies to resolve the issues and raise these concerns. The committee also raised the need to improve public transport in Faversham and rural areas.

Western area committee is addressing the run down nature of the area and is working with Kent County Council and Highways England and requesting deep cleans. Sittingbourne area committee is addressing issues specific to the urban area that were highlighted following ward walks. These include, speeding, fly-tipping, parking issues among others.

Sheppey area committee is taking the issue of flooding at Warden village to the Cabinet Member who is in ongoing discussions with the Environment Agency about this matter. The committee also gave the community the opportunity to raise local matters of concern to the Police.

# Are you ready for winter? **\***

Part of preparing for winter is making sure you know what to do if there's an issue with your power, water or gas supply. Although power cuts and water supply issues are increasingly rare, they can still happen especially during severe weather. They can be particularly worrying for people in vulnerable circumstances.

A number of providers have priority register services which offer free additional support and advice to pensioners, families with young children and people with special needs, disabilities or health conditions. Each supplier will offer something different but you can find out how to sign up below.

#### **UK Power Networks**

UK Power Networks owns and maintains the cables delivering electricity to the South East and their engineers fix any problems with the electricity lines and cables.

If you're on the register, you can access free extra services including:

- A 24-hour priority phone number
- A dedicated team who will keep you updated during a power cut
- Tailored support such as home visits, hot meals, advice and keeping your friends and relatives updated

Being on the register doesn't necessarily mean your power can be restored any quicker, but will mean that UK Power Networks are aware of your needs and can arrange extra support. To apply to be included on the register visit **ukpowernetworks**. **co.uk/priority**, call **0800 169 9970**, or email **psr@ ukpowernetworks.co.uk**.

#### **Southern Water**

This is a confidential register for customers who have individual needs, and ensures their employees know about any special circumstances or needs you may have. Southern Water can then provide additional support including help if your water supply is interrupted, bills and letters in large print or braille, talking bills and frequent meter readings.

To be added to the register you can phone for free on **0800 027 0800** from 9am–5pm, Monday to Friday. You'll need to make sure you have your payment reference number to hand, this can be found on your bill.

Alternatively you can apply online by visiting **southernwater.co.uk/ help-advice/join-our-priorityservices-register**.

#### South East Water

By registering for South East Water's Priority Services, you can:

- Receive prior warning of planned work which may interrupt your water supply
- Receive priority treatment should your water supply be interrupted (such as arranging an alternative source as quickly as possible, and including hand-delivering bottled drinking water to customers with mobility issues)
- Receive important information and bills in a more convenient format, such as large print or the spoken word, where our normal presentation style is not suitable

- Nominate somebody else to receive your water bill on your behalf (the person you nominate must agree to this)
- If English isn't your first language they may be able to help you with an interpretation service when you call
- Receive information about specialist organisations which are able to provide advice on possible adaptations to water fittings and appliances around the home

#### **British Gas**

The British Gas Priority Service offers services such as large print or Braille bills and free gas safety checks. They will also share your data with your network operator, who will get in touch if your electricity supply is going to be interrupted. They'll help you figure out what to do to stay safe.

• are over 65 • have a disability or long-term illness

rely on medical equipment in your home 
have a child or children under the age of five
have gone through a recent bereavement 
break-up or job loss 
are recovering from a hospital treatment 
are living independently for the first time
