Blue flags for Sheppey beaches

Minster Leas and Sheerness beaches are flying the prestigious Blue Flag again this year.

The beaches are among only 78 sites in the country, and 14 in the South East, to receive the Blue Flag Award.

The award is widely considered to be the gold standard for beaches, and flying the Blue Flag means the beach has met the highest standards for cleanliness, facilities and water quality.

The two beaches, along with Leysdown beach, also received the Seaside Award. This is Keep Britain Tidy's own award for beaches that meet the very highest standards for cleanliness and facilities, which has been awarded to 128 beaches in the country this year.

Day of action to crackdown on fly tipping

In May we teamed up with Kent Police's Rural Task Force to carry out enquiries and collate evidence with a view to prosecuting offenders for waste related crimes.

As a result we stopped and searched four vehicles and issued three Fixed Penalty Notices.

"Although the low rates being offered by some carriers may seem like a cheap and easy way to clear your waste, it could land you with a large fine.

"Remember, if using a waste carrier, it's your responsibility to make sure they're licensed. If any illegally carried or dumped waste leads back to you, you could receive a £400 FPN.

"Always ask to see a waste carriers license before using them."

You should check whether someone is licenced to carry waste by visiting the Environment Agency website below, or alternatively call **03708 506506**. It also helps if householders receive a written receipt or transfer note, including contact details, description of waste removed and details of where the waste is being taken to.



Lower emissions for grounds maintenance

Our grounds maintenance contractor Blenwood have introduced new zero emission and environmentally friendly vehicles and equipment to help provide the lowest emission fleet possible.

As part of their contract, they were tasked with helping meet our climate and ecological targets and part of this was introducing a low emission

fleet and equipment over the next few years. Blenwood were quick to action and have added zero emission and low emission vehicles to their fleet including

- 3x Electric Vauxhall Combo E (with zero emissions)
- 1x Valtra Hi tech N135
 Tractor (with a Euro 6.2 rated emission standard)

 1x Azura flex road sweeper (with a Euro 6.2 rated emission standard)

The rest of the fleet all have at least a Euro 6.0 rated emission standard.

Blenwood have also introduced a variety of electric hand-held tools including blowers, hedge cutters and strimmers to be used on some smaller sites.

Helping to make our town centres safer

We're encouraging local businesses and shopkeepers to sign up to Swale's radio communication scheme to help reduce crime and theft in Swale's town centres.

We joined forces with Kent Police and the National Association of Business Crime Partnerships to create the Business Crime Reduction Partnership who will run the scheme.

Previously, a similar scheme was run by a private company, but has now been relaunched by the partnership using the council's CCTV.

The scheme is called Swale Link and is available to local businesses and organisations in Faversham, Sittingbourne, Sheerness and Leysdown.

The Town Centre Radio Scheme has received £49,000 from the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

We've also created a new business crime website for members to share intelligence with each other, such as photos to help our CCTV team, Kent Police and other businesses look out for offenders banned from the scheme

Community champions recognised with Civic Awards

This year saw the first ever Civic Awards, which recognised people who have made an outstanding contribution to life in our community.

The former Mayor of Swale, Cllr Simon Clark, handed the honours to the award winners. He said: "When we originally announced the awards and asked for nominations, we had no idea how many we would receive but I was heartened to find that there are so many people in our community who are prepared to give their time, energy and expertise to improve the lives of others.

"Swale has some exceptional individuals who are making a valuable contribution to community life and it was very difficult to narrow this down to just three Civic Award Winners. We therefore agreed that we would give a Highly Commended Award."

Mike Brown was given a Highly Commended Award for his years dedicated to charity work. As president of Rotary Minster on Sea he has helped to fundraise both internationally for disasters, such as the war in Ukraine and earthquake in Turkey, and closer to home - Sheppey Foodbanks and Sheppey Matters to name a few.

Anna Stonor was the first to receive a Civic Award for her active role in improving the local environment. She is secretary to and helped set up the Friends of Westbrook and Stonebridge pond - a group of volunteers who help care for and maintain one of Swale's important areas for local people and wildlife. She holds talks for the residents of Faversham who are interested in conservation and works on projects concerning climate change, air quality and flooding.

Yvonne Crawford gets up early every Saturday morning so that other people can get fit and stay fit. She has been the event director of Sittingbourne Park run for over 4 years. It cannot function without a team of deeply committed and reliable volunteers. After a recent Parkrun one of the runners suffered a cardiac arrest and she and other runners were able to perform CPR and use the defibrillator to re-start the heart while waiting for ambulances.

She also organises food parcel donations for the local food bank throughout the year and works closely with the Friends of Milton Creek to promote their community events such as organising litter picks or tree planting.

Rebecca O'Neill started a community interest company to provide respite and short breaks for disabled young people in Swale. This means many disadvantaged young people have the support of an organisation that champions the needs of young people and their families, particularly those with learning or other disabilities. For young people who find mainstream school daunting, she has set up Craftworks College which allows them to work in small groups on practical skills such as horticulture, animal care and creative crafts alongside the functional skills of English and maths.

A Lifetime Achievement award was given to Dale Howting (BEM), the Whistling Postman. Dale has raised £320,000 since he began fundraising in 1977. For many years he could be seen in the town centre, braving all weathers on his beautifully decorated bike - giving a smile and welcome to passersby. Now in his 89th year, he fractured his shoulder but is not deterred and most mornings he is back collecting in the town.

The charities who have benefited from his fundraising are too numerous to mention but they include Kent Air Ambulance, Demelza House, St Michael's Church and Swale Community Church.



£1million funding for safer walking in Faversham

Faversham has gained almost £1million in government funding to improve the cross-town walking route running from the east to the west of Faversham.

Working with Kent County Council and Faversham Town Council, we built a successful bid that built on the details of Faversham's Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan.

The £995,000 scheme, called the Faversham Cross Town Path, will include new crossings and junction improvements to create a more pedestrian and cycle friendly environment.

It will be paid for by the Government's Active Travel England fund.

The improvements will work alongside Faversham Town Council's 20mph area and will be among the first new changes to encourage drivers to watch their speed.


Cllr Rich Lehmann,

action to combat the climate and ecological emergency in Swale, which is why we were happy to put resources into this bid. This won't just bring environmental benefits, but will also make a difference to local people's health and wellbeing by helping to make walking and cycling a more viable alternative to the car."

Levelling Up fund success

In January it was announced that we were awarded £20 million from the Government's Levelling Up Fund to improve health, education, leisure, and employment opportunities in Sheerness.

This comes after months of work with stakeholders, the community, and businesses to put together a strong bid proposal that fit within the strict guidelines set out by government for the bid.

Swale was identified as one of 100 priority areas in the country that were prioritised to apply for up to £20 million from the LUF for capital projects to support

economic recovery and growth. The characteristics of the borough that merited this priority status are most evident in Sheerness, so we worked closely with the local MP, Gordon Henderson, who backed the proposals.

We want to thank residents for their time and thoughts that went into the consultation period when putting together the bid to go to government. There were some really interesting ideas included, and we are sorry we couldn't include more of them. Due to the strict criteria, not everything could be included, and the funding we have received means there are limitations as to what we can achieve, especially with the rising cost of inflation.

The scheme will expand the existing Healthy Living Centre to provide more and better services for local people, including better GP facilities.

Sheppey College will offer new courses to give young people aged 14-18 on the

opportunities, and will offer adult education courses.

The conversion of the Masters House out buildings to new creative studios and workspace will help create and support local jobs. Whilst the main office space will allow for new start up businesses and young entrepreneurs to gain support.

There will also be new leisure activities such as soft play, adventure golf, TAG active, new café and outdoor gym at Beachfields. Allowing local people and visitors a greater choice of things to do in the town.

The funding will also deliver public realm improvements from the train station and around the leisure complex. Improvements will be made to better connect the high street, train station and seafront to encourage visitors to explore and enjoy more of the town.

The progress of Sheerness Revival will be discussed at the next Sheppey Area Committee, the date and location will be confirmed soon.

Report it

Got home from work and need to report an issue but it's out of office hours? No problem, you can fill in one of our forms to report it.

If your bin has been missed, head to swale. gov.uk/report-a-missed-bin within two working days of when your bin was due to be collected.

Know a street that needs cleaning? You can report it online at swale.gov.uk/request-a-street-clean or if you know an area that has litter or fly-tipping you can report these online too, for litter, visit swale. gov.uk/report-litter and for fly-tipping head to swale.gov.uk/fly-tipping.

Apply for it

Not only can you report issues online, but you can also make applications. One of the things you can do is apply for a garden waste bin subscription. It's quick and easy to do, head to swale.gov.uk/ subscribe-to-gardenwaste, all you'll need is

- any special instructions about delivering or collecting your new garden waste bin

Help available for households

During the cost of living crisis that everyone across the country is currently experiencing, you may be eligible for help with your food and the cost of utilities through the Household Support Fund.

The scheme is funded by the Government and is for those most in need of support to help with significantly rising living costs.

ElectionsMay 2023

The beginning of May was a busy one for our elections team with local elections taking place. The results of the elections brought with it a host of changes and around 23 new councillors.

We had 47 seats contested in the borough elections for 24 wards. There were also seats available for some town and parish councils, as well as a Kent County Council seat for Sheppey.

There have been changes in most wards in the borough, so you may now have a different councillor representing you for your ward. You can find the details of your new councillors on pages 22 and 23.

Election day was a busy one, with polling station staff working across the borough to ensure you were able to cast your votes from 7am to 10pm.

Day of the count

As with all local elections, we count the following day to ensure everyone is well rested and able to focus on counting the close to 44,000 ballot papers for borough, town, parish and county council elections. We only count overnight for general elections.

It can feel like it takes a while for the first results to come through even though we start at around 9.30 in the morning. This is because there are a few different stages to get through before the actual counting can begin. Our count teams go through seven different stages to get to a declaration of the result for each of the ward seats, and can sometimes take longer for wards that have more than one seat available.

Verification

Each ballot box has a unique number, and are checked in on arrival of the counting hall after polling stations have closed. The number of ballot papers in each box is then counted to make sure it matches the number of papers issued at each polling station.

Sorting

Once verified, ballot papers from different boxes are mixed to further ensure the secrecy of the vote. They are then allocated to count teams, who sort the ballot papers by candidate.



Adjudication

Ballot papers that aren't clearly marked with an X next to a candidate are then adjudicated by an official. As long as the voter's intention is clear, the vote can be counted, if it isn't then the ballot paper is rejected as a spoiled vote.

Counting

After the sorting is complete, count teams will then count the number of votes cast for each candidate.

6 Reverification

The valid and rejected votes are then added together and checked against the total number of ballot papers from the first stage of the count.

6 Provisional result

This is then shared with the candidates and their election agents to check they are content with how the count has been conducted. This is when any requests for a recount can be considered.

Declaration

Once candidates and their agents are satisfied, the result will be declared publicly. This is when we post the results on our website and on social media, and the official declaration of the result will be posted at our council offices.

Voter ID

This was also the first election that saw the introduction of photo ID being required to cast your vote, and it will be needed for all future elections. There are many forms of photo ID that are accepted including:

- Passport
- Driving Licence
- Blue Badge
- Older Person's Bus Pass
- Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- Oyster 60+ card
- Freedom Pass
- Registered Blind Smart Pass

- Identity card with the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card)
- Biometric immigration document
- Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card)
- National identity card issued by an EEA state

You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you and the name on your ID should be the same name you used to register to vote.

A stunning rural walk with vistas of both coast and countryside around Upchurch, Lower Halstow and Newington. Open fields with scenic views, salt marsh and estuary birdlife, wharfs and Thames barges, woodland glades with bluebells in season, ancient churches, quiet country lanes, traditional country pubs and village life. This walk truly has it all.





King & Country Trail

Step out of the urban into the rural. From a park that celebrates a king, across open fields to the picturesque rural hamlet of Tunstall with its ancient church and lovely countryside views. Then onward across orchards to the village of Borden with its traditional pub, nature reserve and church.



The Woodland and Duck Ponds Trail

A wonderful country walk via the picturesque village of Rodmersham, with its village green, duck ponds, coffee shop, pub and church. Walk across open fields, through fruit orchards and along leafy woodland trails, with an optional extra loop thrown in.



Estuary Edgelands Explore

A rural ride through Newington, Iwade, Lower Halstow and Upchurch, with views of the estuary and countryside. Enjoy open fields with scenic views, salt marsh and estuary birdlife, acres of orchards, ancient churches, quiet country lanes and traditional country pubs.



Ride in the shadow of The Downs

A circular ride through the hamlets and villages of Rodmersham, Milstead, Bredgar, Oad Street, Borden and Tunstall, that sit in the beautiful countryside north of The Downs.

Grass cuttings, leaves and flowers are perfect for the garden waste bin but remember, please pop these in loose – no black sacks!

Recycling made easy



Do you know what you're doing when it comes to recycling? It can be a bit tricky when there are different rules for different councils. Some items it is easy to tell what bin it should go in, but others might be a little more tricky.

To help ensure we are able to recycle as much as possible, we need clean, uncontaminated recycling.

We're unfortunately seeing more lorry loads of recycling rejected because of nonrecyclable items causing contamination.

The worst offenders are clothes and textiles, food waste, black sacks and carrier bags, sanitary products and nappies. None of these should be going in your recycling bin.

How do I know what to recycle?

If you are unsure what bin you should pop something in, we have a handy online tool that's really quick and simple to use. Head to swale.gov.uk/what-goes-in-my-bin and simply type in the name of the item you want to dispose of.

Most searched for items

Plastic tubs – plastic food tubs can go in with your recycling in your blue bin.

Metal pots and pans – pots and pans shouldn't go in your bin and should be taken to your local household waste and recycling centre.

Unopened canned goods

 if it is still in date but just unwanted, then please think about donating unopened cans to your nearest food bank.
 Alternatively, empty contents into your food recycling caddy and place the rinsed out can into your recycling container.

Food waste – if you have any food waste, you should use your food waste bin. Don't already have one? Order a bin and caddy online for free by calling 01795 417888.

Garden waste – if you have garden waste, consider getting a brown garden waste bin subscription. To find out more, visit swale.gov. uk/garden-waste or call 01795 417888.



Handy recycling tips



Please make sure your recycling is free from food residue, as food can cause contamination. You don't need to use clean running water for this, the waste water after you've washed your dishes will do the trick.



Flatten your cardboard boxes, you can fit more in your recycling bins that way.



Have a system: keep a clear recycling bag, cardboard box, or bin next to your rubbish bin as a reminder for everyone in your house to recycle.



When recycling plastic bottles don't forget items like shampoo and mouthwash bottles.

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Changes to collections in Marine Town coming this October

After successful trials in three roads in Marine Town, we'll be rolling out weekly food waste collections and alternate weekly general waste and recycling collections across the rest of Marine Town in October.

The food waste collections is in direct response to many Marine Town residents requesting the service to be introduced.

To help cut down on food waste, district councils in England will be required to offer kerbside food waste recycling collections to all residents over the next few years.

Marine Town residents will be provided with a 23 litre food waste bin, a 5 litre silver caddy for inside the kitchen and a roll of compostable food waste bags. These will be delivered at least one week prior to the first collection date.

The food waste collections are also being introduced alongside moving residents to alternate weekly collections for general waste and recycling. We will be getting touch with Marine Town residents directly over the coming weeks about what this will mean for them and how to make the most of their food waste bins.

Food waste recycling helps you see what food is going to waste each week and it gives you the opportunity to adjust, which saves you money and makes the most of the food you are buying.

If you are not yet signed up to weekly food waste collections, call **01795 417888.** Food waste bins are provided for free to residents and they are a key step towards reaching our net zero carbon targets.







Are you part of the **Food Waste problem?**

Using a food waste bin makes it easier to see what is going to waste each week, and by trying a few of these simple things as part of your weekly routine you'll quickly see how a few small actions make a real difference both to your pocket and the planet.

- Stay in control of your shopping – by making a few simple habits such as sticking to what you have on your shopping list, minimising impulse food purchases and meal planning, you can spend less, and save on potential food waste.

- Storing your food after shopping – putting your food away in all the right places will keep it fresher for longer, which means there's more time for you to use it for a delicious meal, and you're less likely to create waste of something left unused.
- Keep an eye on your fresh food – keep track of your perishables and fresh food and remember frequently check to use up what is likely to go off first.
- Save what you can eat as much of the food as is possible by using up all the edible parts of fresh food, and by freezing left overs to be used later.

If you can't reduce the amount of food you throw away, please pop it in your food waste bin. We send food waste from your black and orange food waste bins to an anaerobic digester where it is then turned into soil conditioner to grow new food.

By using a food waste bin, you could remove up to 23 litres of food waste from your green bin every week. No amount of food is too little, we will still collect it weekly alongside your other bins.

Top tips for keeping your food bin clean:

 Put all food waste into a compostable liner bearing the Seedling log (or a sheet of newspaper or kitchen roll) before putting it in the food caddy.

- Don't overfill the compostable liner so that the top of the bag can be twisted to contain the waste inside the bag (to prevent the food waste spilling out of the bag) and into the black and orange bin.
- Keep the lid of both your kitchen caddy and black and orange food bins shut at all times, and lock the lids by lifting the handles.
- Rinse out your bin regularly with boiling water and salt.
- Put your food bin out for collection every week.
- When it's hot keep your bin out of direct sunlight.

Compostable bags

These can be bought from most supermarkets, please only use bags with the Seedling logo. Compostable bags bearing the Seedling logo indicate that they have been certified as industrially compostable and are made of compostable matter like cornstarch or potato, which fully breakdown in controlled composting environments.

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


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
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
