Frankly there have been far more issues with it than any of us could have reasonably anticipated and it is our intention to ensure that the contract is the subject of thorough scrutiny to examine why we have experienced the difficulties that we have.

As summer is upon us there are some excellent opportunities for healthy activities in Swale and as we look to enjoy the sunshine and leisure time it is with great pride that I am able to announce that once again we have been awarded blue flag status for beaches on the Isle of Sheppey. We have also teamed up with Peel Ports, HM Coastguard and others to form the Swale Personal Watercraft Partnership to address issues of dangerous use of Jet Ski's.

In closing, however you choose to spend your summer remember that there is plenty to do in our Borough but please do it safely and considerately but most of all enjoyably too.

To help provide people with multiple and complex disabilities better access to council leisure centres we've made improvements to changing and toilet facilities.

We installed accessible changing places at Swallows Leisure Centre in Sittingbourne, and the Sheppey Leisure Complex in the Swimming Pool building.

The works were funded by over £127,000 from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing & Communities and a further £20.000 from the council.

We worked closely with the Changing Places Consortium to make sure the new changing places meet the needs of disabled people within the borough, and the changing places are Muscular Dystrophy UK (MDUK) certified and include:

- height-adjustable, adult-sized changing bench
- ceiling track hoist system
- space for the disabled person and two assistants
- peninsular toilet with space both sides for assistants, with a backrest
- privacy screen
- wide paper roll and large waste disposal bin
- height adjustable washbasin


Every year we ask you to nominate residents who work tirelessly to better their communities, with the mayor and judging panel honouring them with awards.

Stewart Kitching, chairman of the Swale Stroke Group, and couple Brenda and Peter Fathers, chair and fundraising officer of MS Swale, were all awarded the Civic Award which commends their efforts to make Swale a better place.

Whilst Paul Murray MBE, board member of Sheppey Matters, Swale CVS, and Swale Community Leisure, won the special Mayor's Lifetime Achievement Award which recognises a person's lifelong commitment to helping others.

Rev Dan Corcoran, founder of Gems Awards and Mobile Youth Trailers, and Jason Firmager, founder of Mentalkhealth, have also been given the Highly Commended Award, thanking them for their selfless community work.



Swale's three beaches have been named amongst the best in the country after winning awards.

Sheerness beach will once again be flying the international Blue Flag Award this year which is widely considered to be the gold standard for beaches.

It is one of only 74 beaches that meets the very highest standards for cleanliness, facilities and water quality and has also been awarded Keep Britain Tidy's Seaside Award.

Leysdown and Minster Leas beaches also received the Seaside Award, which recognises and celebrates the best beaches in the country.

This award went to only 137 beaches this year and measured their safety and services, the environmental information available, water quality and their litter and waste management.

Help keep our coasts safe this summer

Irresponsible and dangerous jet ski users could face unlimited fines and prison this summer.

We teamed up with Peel Ports, HM Coastguard and others to form the Swale Personal Watercraft Partnership (PWP) to warn people against dangerous jet ski use.

Peel Ports will be having regular enforcement days covering the River Medway and the Swale to help make sure that people are not acting recklessly while on their personal watercraft. This includes enforcing the 8 knots speed limit in Queenborough Harbour and 6 knots limit upriver of Folly Point.

The Coastguard and RNLI Sheerness Lifeboat will be ready to respond in case of an emergency in the water this summer, but that doesn't mean that people should be taking unnecessary risks when on the water.

Following a change in government legislation the council now have the power to issue unlimited fines to anyone riding a jet ski carelessly or causing harm to others, and they could face up to two years in prison.

The legislation puts the responsibility on users, operators and owners of powered watercraft to make sure they protect not just themselves but others in the water from harm.

We have also installed signage to warn against this kind of behaviour which, since covid, has increased significantly resulting in completely avoidable tragedies in the water.

If you are thinking of using a jet ski, please make sure you:

- Ride in company
- Get trained and insured
- Respect marine life and others in the water and keep your distance
- Act responsibly and protect and promote safe riding

Conservation areas expanded across the Borough

Conservation areas in Sittingbourne, Faversham and Sheerness have been expanded to include more areas of local importance.

We reviewed the conservation areas for Milton Regis, Mile Town, Marine Town, Faversham Town and Preston Next-Faversham as part of our commitment to deliver our adopted Heritage Strategy.

After undertaking a public consultation on the conservation areas' character appraisals and the proposed management plan, the council has decided to expand the conservation areas' borders.

We, as the local planning authority, are responsible for reviewing conservation areas from time to time.

These reviews offer the opportunity to see if the areas still possess the special architectural and historic interest and are worthy of continued designation, which made them conservation areas in the first place.

We also assessed how successful the designations had been over the past 50 years and whether they should be expanded or made smaller.

Once an area has been designated a conservation area planning permission is needed to alter or demolish even unlisted buildings, trees within the area are given special protections and, in some cases, development is more restricted.

Milton Regis

Milton Regis Conservation Area is one of Kent's ancient settlements and includes the highest concentrations of listed buildings in the borough.

The town's prosperity, in the medieval period, was due to Milton Creek which offered easy access to London, the east coast and the continent for trade, making Milton one of the biggest ports in Kent at the time.

The border has been amended to include more local areas of importance like the ancient retaining wall fronting Crown Road and removes other areas like parking spaces which have no architectural or historic interest.

Faversham

The Faversham Town Conservation Area contains the majority of the 349 listed, historically important, buildings in the area.

The sizeable expansion to its borders will incorporate Athelstan Road, Ethelbert Road, Canute Road and Kingsnorth Road which includes the Dutch influenced Ethelbert Road Primary School building.

The other additions are Gordon Square, built in the 1920s, which is an example of early public housing construction, and Macknade Avenue, built in 1945, directly after the end of WW2.

Preston Next-Faversham is a small settlement south of the main Faversham conservation area and stretches along Canterbury Road, forming part of the old Roman Watling Street, and has significant historic value.

The conservation area has been expanded to include the terraced properties south of Canterbury Road, including a former blacksmith.

Sheerness


Sheerness began its life as grazing land reclaimed from marsh, while a permanent settlement was established when an artillery fort was developed in 1545 at the tip of the headland. Sheerness is Old English "clear headland".

Marine Town Conservation Area will almost double in size, as the new borders better encapsulate the historically important assets of the area.


The new boundaries incorporate three listed buildings, which form part of the earliest development of the town:
Neptune Terrace, Windmill Court and the Roman Catholic Church of St Henry and St Elizabeth.

In addition, the remainder of Alma Street, with its terraced houses, will also be included within the conservation area.

Mile Town Conservation Area will also be expanding to include the full extent of the early core of historic development in this area, including houses off Hope Street and the former waterworks south of Holy Trinity.



Children on the Isle of Sheppey became budding gardeners at a family event made possible by funding from the Safer Streets project.

We teamed up with Sheppey Matters to help keep Sheerness clean, provide people with access to gardening and engage with youth to tackle anti-social behaviour.

The Community Gardener scheme, run by the local charity and funded by Safer Streets, hosted a family gardening event where children could get their hands dirty whilst learning about sowing and planting.

They also organise regular community litter picking days, collecting multiple bags worth of waste that have been abandoned in the green spaces and on the streets around the healthy living centre in Beachfields.

Community gardening volunteers and Sheppey Matters Garden club have also been sowing flower seeds around Sheerness to add future pops of colour to the Beachfields area and help pollinators.

The scheme is also engaging with Sheppey College students who have begun gardening, planting summer bulbs, weeding and watering the planters at Beachfields whilst discussing the anti-social behaviour they witness.

Through the Community Safety Partnership, we worked with the Kent Police and Crime Commissioner to secure £265,616 from the Government's Safer Streets Fund.

The money is being invested into measures in Sittingbourne and Sheerness Town Centres that help tackle the higher level of crime, antisocial behaviour and violence against women and girls.



Cllr Richard Palmer, chair of the council's community committee, said:

"Gardening is an amazing way to get out in nature, get active and socialize and can have a positive impact on people's mental wellbeing.

"The Safer Streets' gardening club is a safe space for the adults and the youth of the island to get together and enjoy a shared hobby, all while improving their community and helping the environment."



Cllr Elliott Jayes, vice chair of the community committee, said:

"Having accessible youth provision on the island is also incredibly important to us, that is why we are helping fund initiatives like this gardening club.

"Engaging with kids and teens is a proven way of reducing anti-social behaviour and gives them the opportunity to express themselves in a positive way."

Gemma Hunt, Sheppey Matters community gardener, said:

"The goal of the community gardening initiative is to inspire and involve individuals of all ages in the community to work together to enhance their living environment.

"By nurturing these spaces, the aim is to discourage and decrease littering, vandalism, and antisocial behaviour.

"The community Litter Heroes group meet monthly to tidy up the Beachfields area, which is already showing positive results.

"Additional youth gardening events and adult and youth clean-up activities are scheduled for the upcoming summer months."



Sheerness Clock Tower lights up

The Clock Tower will now light up Sheerness High Street in a range of colours to commemorate significant local and national events.

It was lit up red, white and blue to mark the D-Day landings, acting as a reminder of the sacrifices made during the WWII. It also marked the King's birthday in June in the colours of the Union Jack.


The Clock Tower will also honour those lost in naval tragedies like the sinkings of HMS Princess Irene, HMS Bulwark, HMS Truculent and SS Richard Montgomery.

The schedule of illumination includes tributes to historic events like Remembrance Day and the first circular flight by an Englishman in a Britishbuilt plane, which took place in Eastchurch.

It will also acknowledge modern-day concerns, marking World Polio Day, International Women's Day, Pride, and showing solidarity with Ukraine by glowing in blue and yellow.

Following the Queen's passing the schedule needed to be updated to celebrate the King Charles' birthday and, during this process, we added more dates of importance to the schedule.

When not commemorating significant occasions, the tower will be lit with white lights from half an hour before dusk until midnight every day.





Over 50 refurbished bicycles were sold for just £10 each at Big Green Week events.

The Swale Cycle-re-Cycle scheme teamed up with Sheppey Matters to provide people with an affordable, environmentally friendly transportation method.

The 30 refurbished bicycles available at the Healthy Living Centre in Sheerness on 14 June sold out in under an hour.

HMP Swaleside also helped sell a further 25 bikes at the Faversham Community Bike Day on 15 June.

The Swale Cycle-re-Cycle scheme is a partnership between Swale Borough Council, HMP Swaleside and the Canterbury Bike Project.

The bikes, which were refurbished by HMP Swaleside inmates, have been saved from rotting away in gardens, sheds and garages or from ending up in the tip.

They work towards City & Guilds Cycle Mechanics qualifications giving them the opportunity to upskill themselves and take a positive step towards rehabilitation.


The scheme's aim is to provide Swale residents with affordable, environmentally friendly transportation, that helps them keep active and healthy.

The council funded the initial supply of bike parts and workshop consumables, while Canterbury Bike Project trained an instructor to deliver the City & Guilds qualification.

The bikes are sold for just £10 through local community groups, like Sheppey Matters, which covers the cost of the repairs and makes the scheme self-funding and sustainable.

If you have a roadworthy bike

– two wheels and two brakes you would like to donate, drop
it off at the donation point at the
Sheerness Household Waste
Recycling Centre, along with new
or good condition used parts.







If your local project in Swale is looking for extra support, you can apply for funding from your local councillor to help them make a difference in the community.

We have reopened the member grant scheme with £47,000 being available to support small-scale, local community projects.

Swale's 47 councillors have £1,000 each available to fund projects that provide benefits in areas such as culture, sport, recreation, health, environment, community safety, crime reduction and education.

at the council, said:

"The people who really understand what their area needs are those who live there, and member grants enable us to help these local people's work to improve their community.

"We put aside this money every year so we can support as many important local community projects that we can.

"A small amount of money can make a huge difference for community groups and projects, so we want to make sure we're doing what we can to support them."

Clir Elliott Jayes, vice chair of the community committee, said:

"You can apply for anything that will provide benefit to your community in areas such as culture, sport, recreation, health, environment and community safety, no matter how small it may seem.

"We as councillors are looking forward to hearing from, and offering support to, the people and organisations who are working incredibly hard to make Swale a better place."

Last year over 200 grants were made to local groups to support projects, including:

Iwade Parish Council receiving £1,100 to purchase a defibrillator for the village

Child's Vision Charity receiving £150 to purchase storage boxes for their clothes bank

Children and Families charity receiving £2,250 to support their food bank and to run slow cooker cooking courses.

The application process simply needs the person or group to discuss the project with their local councillor to get their support.

They will then complete the relevant form and submit the application for approval to the council.

Interested parties can apply to one or more councillors for funding and could have all, or part, of their project funded.

"The Sheerness Revival programme is all about making a real difference in people's lives.

"We are grateful to everyone who provided feedback to the consultation on the draft plans, and these have helped shape the final proposals.

"These new leisure facilities are a key part of our vision for a healthier, happier Sheerness, and we're excited to see this project move forward."

Alliance Leisure has submitted a planning application for the ambitious redevelopment of the Sheppey Leisure Complex and Healthy Living Centre at Beachfields.

This project, part of the £20 million Sheerness Revival initiative, promises to transform the leisure landscape for the Island and improve the health and wellbeing of the local community.

The proposed plans include a significant expansion of the existing facility, modernizing the GP practice, creating a new café, upgrading the gym, and introducing innovative activities like soft play and tag active. The redevelopment also aims to enhance outdoor spaces, improving connectivity with the park, town centre, and railway station, while adding adventure golf and expanding the splash pad area.

This project is one of three transformative initiatives under the Sheerness Revival project, funded by the Government's Levelling Up Fund.

In addition to the Beachfields redevelopment, plans for a Sheppey College extension and additional business units at Masters House have also been submitted for planning permission.

The redevelopment plans have been informed by extensive community consultation, helping the project to reflect the needs and desires of local residents.

If approved, the Sheppey Leisure Complex and Healthy Living Centre will become a good quality community asset for years to come.

We would like to apologise for the issues that you have been experiencing with the waste collections in Swale.

We started the new service contract on 25 March with Suez Recycling and Recovery UK who are now responsible for the waste and recycling collections across Swale. We were aware that an element of disruption is usual when introducing a new waste service and we know that the start of this contract has led to many of you experiencing problems with collections, for which we sincerely apologise.

As part of the new contract, new collection routes and vehicles were introduced which will lead to a more resilient service longer term, but we absolutely acknowledge that disruption has been way higher than anyone expected and the level of inconvenience to some residents has been unacceptable.

Councillors and officers have been working hard to ensure service improvement, meeting with Suez daily to update them with the problems you have been experiencing and discussing their recovery plan.

We have required Suez to provide additional vehicles and staff at their own cost for catch up rounds while the new routes bed in and have also redeployed our own staff to provide support in the customer contact centre and additional inspectors monitoring the work of Suez. We are very sorry that despite these measures some of you are still not receiving the level of service we feel is acceptable and we would like to thank you for your patience during what is a very frustrating time.

Our customer service centre phone lines remain busy, and we know it can be incredibly irritating when the lines are engaged, but please be assured that we have increased the resource in the contact centre as we strive to answer as many queries as possible.

We are also aware that there have been frustrations at not receiving responses to emails, but our focus has been passing the details to Suez to try and rectify the issues, please be assured that the council is actioning every email we receive, even if we are unable to respond.

In closing we would like to reiterate that the improvement in the waste service remains our top priority, thank you all for the patience, understanding and forbearance that you have shown and we can assure you that we will continue to work hard to improve the services that we deliver.
